Intent of the jottings:

THOUGHTS FOR RFLECTION AND DISCUSSION.

Suggested Thoughts:

- Sacraments and the Eucharist in particular, are not "magic"...
- They do not work automatically...
- The dispositions and attitudes of the recipients are essential...
- The sacraments are "signs" of a deep spiritual realities, namely:
 God's presence within us, the Spirit of God building a community of believers.
 The family of God's children. the Mystical Body of Christ.
- Those realities should be present...If they is not there the sacraments turn into are false signs...deceptive signs...
- The reality represented by the Eucharist is the "unity" of all Christians...of all men...All partake of the same table...of the same banquet...
- Many grains of wheat, but one loaf. Many grapes crushed to fill one cup with wine...
- Christ is the bread broken for me and you, for us and all...
- We too have to be the bread of Christ to be broken for all...
- Participation in the Eucharist means participation of life...in everybody's life...joys and sorrows...successes and failures...
- The Eucharist has essentially a "social" dimension. We are all "one"... interrelated...one body. The "Body of Christ"...

APPENDIX Activities

- Activities may be based on the lyrics of the song "The Baker Woman"
- Comment on the lyrics of the poem "The Baker Woman", .
- Distribute the different stanzas of the song "The Baker Woman" among the participants.
- You can make smaller groups especially for the occasion.
- The activities are left to the creativity of the group or groups
- Each group will have to prepare an activity based on his stanza or stanzas e.g. a role play, collage, dance drama, a tableau, a photo language story, or any other of their own.
- Each group will present his creation to the house.
- After each presentation, there will be a short evaluation and discussion.
